<p><b>1b) Course of study, textbooks, and other supplementary instructional materials for the child and the policies for inspection and review of those materials.</b></p>	<p>In North Carolina, all schools use the same Standard Course of Study, determined by the State Board of Education. These standards are the knowledge and skills students should understand by the end of each grade/course.</p> <p>The standards can be found on the <a href="#">NCDPI Office of Academic Standards website</a>. 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	<p>Local districts, schools and teachers determine how to teach these standards, including curricula, supplementary materials, books, etc.</p> <p>At KIPP NC, we use rigorous, standards- and research- based curricula in all our subjects. The principal or assistant principals of each of our schools welcomes your engagement on or questions about any or all curricula being taught in our classrooms. Please contact your school to access your student’s curricula.</p>
<p><b>1c) Progress of the child toward achieving State and unit expectations for academic proficiency, including policies for student assessments, and the child’s assessment results, report cards, progress reports.</b></p>	<p>KIPP NC shares progress of students through a variety of ways, including regular report cards, progress reports, and assignment/test feedback. Feedback on conduct is also included.</p> <p>Each school hosts its own Report Card Conference times, and each school routinely sends home progress reports, graded assignments, and test feedback.</p> <p><b>State Assessments:</b> Individual Student Reports for end-of-grade/course tests and other state assessments (English language proficiency assessment) are accessible in the parent portal of Infinite Campus.</p> <p>In NC, all students take end-of-grade assessments for reading and math in grades 3-8. Students take end-of-grade science assessments in grades 5 and 8. In high school, students take end-of-course assessments in English II, Biology, NC Math 1, and NC Math 3.</p> <p>Students in Grade 10 take the Pre-ACT. Students in grade 11 take the ACT.</p> <p>North Carolina’s Department of Public Instruction (NCDPI) selected mCLASS DIBELS® 8th Edition as the state’s K-3 Literacy Assessment. mCLASS is an integrated literacy system based on the Science of Reading. mCLASS has been revised and upgraded from the assessment NC districts have used in the past, based on the latest research and the Science of Reading. It is a valid and reliable assessment, supporting universal literacy screening, screening for risk of dyslexia, and progress monitoring.</p>
<p><b>1d) Qualifications of child’s teachers, including licensure status.</b></p>	<p>Parents and families can look up their child’s teacher licensure status at <a href="#">this website</a>.</p>

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	<p>The licensure lookup webpage does not include current employment information. Families may need additional information (i.e., middle name or license number) to identify the teacher accurately. Substitute teachers (either short or long term) may not hold a NC teaching license.</p> <p>Please contact your school’s Front Office or their Director of Operations to verify an educator’s licensure status.</p>

Tutoring is available in Math, Science and ELA, and is offered via a personalized partnership with district/school leadership to best meet the needs of selected students each semester.</p>

Beyond the many family activities published on your school’s calendar, other opportunities are available to you by contacting your school’s Front Office or Director of Operations.</p>
<p><b>5) Opportunities for parents to learn about rigorous academic programs that may be available for the child, such as Academically and/or Intellectually Gifted programming, honors programs, Career and College Promise and other dual enrollment opportunities, Advanced Placement, Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE) courses, and International Baccalaureate programs, NC Virtual Public School (NCVPS) courses, and accelerated access to postsecondary education.</b></p>	<p>KIPP NC’s Gaston Pride High School offers a variety of options for students to pursue their interests and skills at their academic level. At Pride High, there are the following programs available that are more rigorous and challenging than the standard content for students:</p> <p>Career and College Promise (CCP):  Pride High partners with Halifax Community College to offer dual enrollment opportunities through the CCP program. If your high school student qualifies, students may earn high school credit by completing community college coursework.</p> <p>CCP courses may be taken in the College Transfer or Career and Technical Education pathway. These courses count for both high school and college credit. Tuition is free for families.</p> <p>To learn more about this program, contact the principal of Pride High. Additional information is available on the <a href="#">NCDPI CCP website</a>.</p> <p>Advanced Placement (AP) Courses:</p>

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	<p>Advanced Placement (AP) is a program developed by the College Board to offer college-level curricula and examinations to high school students.</p> <p>In NC, 40 Advanced Placement courses are offered in public high schools. Pride High offers many AP courses. Several AP courses satisfy graduation requirements for NC students as outlined in State Board policy. AP exams are free for NC public high school students enrolled in these courses.</p> <p>Colleges and universities may likely offer college credit for these courses if your child scores a 3 or above on the exam. All of the colleges in the UNC System offer credit.</p> <p>Governor’s School: Each summer, NC Governor’s School offers a unique opportunity for high-achieving rising juniors and seniors to learn with their peers from across the state in an 4-week residential program at two college campus sites.</p> <p>For more information on eligibility and the application process, contact Pride High’s Director of College Counseling, or visit the Governor’s School website, <a href="http://www.ncgovschool.org">www.ncgovschool.org</a>.</p>
